

GAZE aims to entertain and enlighten, but also to challenge, inform and to remember.



PROGRAMMER'S WELCOME ROISÍN GERAGHTY

It is such a personal privilege for me to programme GAZE 2015. particularly in this momentous vear for the Irish LGBT Community. I have relished the opportunity to delve into the cinematic worlds of so many beautiful and interesting queer films, and I fervently hope you eniov the films as much as I do. GAZE 2015 presents an expanded festival programme of 40 feature and short film screenings. Prepare for some tough choices, as the standard of narrative and documentary films this year is outstanding.

Here at GAZE we endeavour to programme films which arouse response, that stimulate conversations and which leave the audience with an insight into characters and worlds which may be outside their comfort zone. Worldwide LGBT film festival smashes such as Stories of our Lives, a series of vignettes based on true stories collected from members of Kenva's LGBT community, and The Amina Profile, a gripping chronicle of an unprecedented media phenomenon, entwine LGBT themes and characters with other current social and political issues. engaging audiences with wider representations of LGBT lives around the world.

These films exist in direct opposition to programmed content such as *Portrait of a Serial Monogamist* and *Tiger Orange*, which explore a more easily recognizable side of LGBT identity. Both hold valuable places in the GAZE programme,

and characterize the spectrum of programming that is intrinsic to the GAZE identity.

GAZE is exceptionally proud to present such high-calibre Irish content this year, including two world premieres of LGBT feature films – *The Participants* and *Fading Away*. Alongside an exceptional selection of Irish Short films, GAZE is delighted to provide a platform to screen and celebrate our indigenous talent.

In many ways, the last few months of programming have been an intense emotional rollercoaster. opening myself up to the worlds of so many different and interesting characters, the lives of which I feel grateful to have been voveur to. I have watched so many films that would normally be outside of my sphere of recognition, and I have loved every minute of it! My advice this year is to challenge yourself with the programme: open vourself up to film outside of your usual prescribed content - see something completely different. and engage in conversations you never thought you would have. Our crazy drag sisters from across the water are the feature of this cinematic donkey-ride, which gives us an insight into the lives of the London East-end drag scene. YesterGAZE - Screening & Panel Discussion 12.30pm - Light House Screen 2 / FREE SCREENING

In the year Ireland became the first country in the world to introduce Marriage Equality by a popular vote, YesterGAZE presents a selection of Irish films which demonstrate that the foundations for this success were sown decades ago.

Three very different films give a great insight into the past and present of Irish LGBT life. The screening will include *An Saol Gay*, directed by Oscar-nominated Louis Marcus, plus *Coming Out, Being Seen, Making History & GAZE - Making History*, both directed by Anna Rodgers. It will be followed by a discussion on the filmic past and present of the Irish LGBT community.

In With The New Out - LGBT Web Series Screening & Panel Discussion 2.30PM - Light House Screen 2

In recent years, web series have progressed in such a rapid fashion that they are one of the best places to find diverse, well rounded portrayals of LGBT characters

In With the New Out presents a collection of the best and brightest of LGBT web series content, including *Discrepance, How to be Gay*, and *Wallflowers*. The screening will be followed by a discussion panel with International LGBT filmmakers Kieran Turner, Camille Chastrusse and Chester Travis, who will tackle the subject surrounding this change in content production and consumption.

Out in Front - LGBT Visibility in Sport Panel Discussion 2.15pm - Festival Hub

Sport is one of society's great levelers. Racism is now faced down in arenas, pools and playing fields across disciplines. Similarly, the recent increased profile of LGBT sportsmen and sportswomen, internationally and at home, has directed the spotlight on the politics of gay visibility in sports. Their achievements and prowess highlight the beneficial significance of mentoring and providing positive role models for young people and children.

A panel discussion on LGBT visibility in sport takes place at the Festival Hub, after the screening of *To Russia with Love*. The Last One: Unfolding the AIDS Memorial Quilt - Film Screening & Discussion

The Last One follows a small group of strangers who, in June 1987, gathered in a San Francisco shopfront to document the lives they feared history would forget. Their goal was to create a memorial quilt for those who had died of AIDS, and to help people understand the devastating impact of the disease.

After the film, Mary Shannon, from the Irish Names Quilt Project, will unveil Ireland's AIDS Memorial Quilt, which will be part of a post-screening chat and exhibition.

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GAZE IRIS PRIZE October 7th - 11th 2015

LGBT film from Ireland will be the official focus of the 2015 Iris Prize festival. The focus is produced by the Iris Prize Film Festival in association with GAZE in Dublin and supported by Outburst Queer Arts Festival from Belfast. The programme will include features and shorts as the focus takes stock of how LGBT people from Ireland are represented on film. If you fancy discussing what you've seen on the big screen there will be a panel session full of experts to put everything into context. And if you fancy a party or two, Iris Prize parties are legendary!

What is the Iris Prize Festival?

The Iris Prize Festival, which has a long and much respected relationship with GAZE, is a five day public event which includes screenings of the 30 short films competing for the Iris Prize, 10 shorts competing for the Best British short, premiere screenings of 20 new feature films, retrospectives, panel sessions, networking opportunities, parties and a glittering awards show.

Why is Iris special?

The Iris Prize – Cardiff's International LGBT Short Film Prize is supported by The Michael Bishop Foundation and continues to be the only LGBT short film prize in the world which allows the winner to make a new film. Iris is what film makers need – funding, support and guidance. The winner receives £30,000 to make their next short film in the UK. 6 short films have been produced to date in collaboration with the winning filmmakers of the Iris Prize.

Irish Premiere

<u>Director in</u> Attendance Out In Front is GAZE's LGBT Sports Strand this year - a special programme of films, features and documentaries, focusing on trailblazing out LGBTQ sportspeople.

Headlining this strand is *Out to Win*, a documentary from award-winning LGBT filmmaker Malcolm Ingram. It is an examination of the lives and careers of aspiring and professional gay and lesbian sportspeople from all over the world.

Framed within the historical context of those stars who came before, this film highlights the current experiences of out athletes and players who must still strive to be their best at their sport, while fighting to represent the LGBTQ community and themselves. The film champions the stories and the voices of sporting pioneers, present-day heroes, tomorrow's superstars and the people surrounding them.

Over the course of one Friday afternoon in New York City, two Muslim teens have their secret lives disturbed by the FBI.

Naz & Maalik are an unlikely couple, two teenagers from devout Muslim families who spend their days philosophising about life, and hustling on the streets of Brooklyn. Their antics draw the attention of a recently deployed FBI agent in the area, who presumes malice in the odd behaviour of the two young lovers.

The film gives an insight to subjects not often given screen time – racial profiling by authority figures, the intersection of Islamophobia and homophobia, and homosexuality within the Muslim Community. Naz & Maalik takes the gay coming-of-age story - as well as the coming-of-age-in-Brooklyn story - and spins it in an original and refreshing direction. Intimate and meditative, Naz & Maalik examines the mysterious forces that animate teenage minds.

Country: Uruguay / Chile Year: 2015 Run Time: 79 minutes Director: Aldo Garay In *The New Man* (El Hombre Nuevo), filmmaker Aldo Garay has drafted a personal and tender portrait of a woman looking back on a tempestuous life, a life in which violence, drugs, prostitution and political commitment have all featured. As 12-year-old boy activist Roberto, now Stephanía, she fought alongside the communist Tupamaros in Uruguay and supported the Sandinista revolution in her own country of Nicaragua, as well as agitating for education and social reforms. Now Stephanía is striving to be accepted by the society she fought for, and her family.

Garay has followed Stephanía's life for twenty years, and what has come into focus in the background is a picture of Nicaraguan society that is as diverse as it is detailed and intimate. The film spans a time of great political upheaval and social change - with a supporting cast of old friends, fellow travellers, activists and family - from the 1970s to the present day.

In an eerie parentless dystopia, a gang of children plays games to gain the favour of Mikhail, the self-proclaimed leader of this strange and isolated society. The mutinous Emilia, Boris and Josef devise a plan to escape Mikhail's tyrannous rule.

There is a classic sci-fi/ B-movie/ apocalypse aesthetic evident in this film. The Participants is an exploration of innocence lost, the abuse of power and the choice to remain passive in the face of oppression.

Developed in collaboration with its cast of children, *The Participants* was filmed in Ireland's midlands, a remarkable landscape of reclaimed bogland that serves as a unique backdrop for Irish LGBT director Paul Rowley's latest film. The director's experience, growing up gay in Ireland, informs the story, a sharp and stylish examination of how societies condone bullying and the alienation of those perceived as 'different'.

Chet and Todd are gay brothers who grew up in a small town in central California with a homophobic single father. The two could not have turned out more different - Chet runs the family hardware store and still lives in the family home, while Todd ran away from home at 18 and never looked back.


In the wake of their father's death, a surprise visit from Todd, now living in LA, shakes up Chet's guarded life and becomes a recipe for disaster. Soon Todd is stirring up trouble, with sexual misadventure and in-your-face bravado. As their long-simmering resentments boil to the surface, the brothers are forced to not only to thrash out their differences, but to examine the common bond they never truly acknowledged.

Country: UK Year: 2015 Run Time: 93 minutes Director: Colin Rothbart For five years Colin Rothbart followed the lives of a sextet of alternative drag superstars in London's East End. Johnny Woo and his cross-dressing clique arrived in Shoreditch in 2003 and found themselves highly in-demand at the forefront of a new drag army and the focus of attention for the fashion press.

Dressed as a Girl takes us from boob jobs and breakdowns to high heels and high drama. The stars of the documentary experience a rollercoaster ride, for better or worse, sharing the journey with the audience. The film is an inspirational, occasionally heartbreaking, but always entertaining insight into alternative gay culture, and a celebration of being yourself and fabulous.

The Amina Profile begins as a simple online love story between two women living in very different parts of the world. Sandra, in Montreal, and Amina, a Syrian-American living in Damascus, bond romantically and intellectually.

Encouraged by Sandra, Amina launches a blog titled 'A Gay Girl in Damascus', representing a marginalised voice in the Middle East on politics, religion, and sexuality. Rapidly garnering worldwide attention, Amina becomes a star blogger. But when Syria enters the Arab uprising of 2011, Sandra receives word that Amina has been kidnapped, and the search for her quickly takes an unexpected turn.

The Amina Profile unravels as a fascinating political thriller - a tale of our time, one which brings into question the ethics, accountability, and very human consequences surrounding identity and the internet.

Country: USA Year: 2015 Run Time: 6 minutes Directors: Todd Verow, Charles Lum With Falcon Studios, gay porn mogul Chuck Holmes built an empire on flesh and fantasy - the gay Hugh Hefner. From 1972 to 2000, Chuck fought against the FBI, vice squads and an AIDS epidemic in order to document emerging gay culture and provide homosexual men across the country with a vision of life that was unashamed and celebratory.

Chuck's business brings him fortune beyond imagining, and powerful friends, but when he attempts to channel his millions into the gay rights movement of the 90s, he finds that his money is sometimes more welcome than he is. Seed Money is the story of Chuck Holmes, one of the gay rights movement's more unlikely - and spirited - pioneers.



GAZE loves any excuse to feature the fabulous work of John Waters, To compliment our closing film. Tab Hunter Confidential, the festival presents a retrospective screening of the film which brought the 1950s teen heartthrob out of obscurity - and into the arms of Divine. As frustrated housewife Francine Fishpaw, Divine tries to maintain her sanity while taking care of her sleazy husband and delinguent teenage children. But when Francine meets dashing Todd Tomorrow (Hunter) her life begins to seem much rosier.

Tab Hunter Confidential was first envisioned when Hunter appeared as a contributor to the documentary I Am Divine, speaking about his time working with Divine on Polyester. This contribution led to filmmaker Jeffrey Schwarz conceiving Hunter's own biopic - the life of a closeted 1950s movie star whose sexuality tortured him throughout his short-lived career, in the golden age of Hollywood.

Condemnation of the host's anti-gay legislation was near-universal leading up to the 2014 Sochi Winter Olympics in Russia. At a time when top athletes were preparing to represent their country, boycotts were being discussed and demands being made to guarantee LGBT competitors' safety - against a backdrop of wrongful arrests and protestor imprisonments, dismantling of LGBT events, and oppression of the country's queer communities.

To Russia With Love follows outré figure skater and sports commentator Johnny Weir and a handful of out gay sportsmen and women as they grapple with their new dual roles as activists and athletes. Narrated by Jane Lynch, and featuring trailblazers such as Billie Jean King and Greg Louganis, this documentary captures the fear, ambition and pride as its stars try to handle the pressure while remaining at their personal peak.

Social media played a significant role in the Marriage Equality referendum. Videos went viral. Personal stories were key to the success. These films have created an archive for future reference.

Openness to go public for a cause wasn't always thus. A perusal of earlier archive material is in stark contrast to the social and digital media campaigns of the personal videos posted by Yes Equality. Yet the personal stories from both eras were both powerful agents for change.

This year's YesterGAZE contrasts the stories behind the earlier and more recent Irish films. The screening will include An Saol Gay, directed by twice Oscarnominated Louis Marcus, plus Coming Out, Being Seen, Making History and Gaze – Making History, both directed by Anna Rodgers. A post-screening panel discussion will highlight how obstacles that existed in earlier films evaporated as we moved forward with technological advances in storytelling.

Country: USA Year: 2013 Run Time: 99 minutes Director: P.J Rayal The subjects of the film *Before You Know It* are no ordinary senior citizens. They are go-go booted bar-hoppers, love struck activists, troublemaking baton twirlers, late night Internet cruisers, seasoned renegades and bold adventurers. They are also among the estimated 2.4 million lesbian, gay and bisexual Americans over the age of 55 in the United States, many of whom face heightened levels of discrimination, neglect and exclusion.

But this is not a film about cold statistics and gloomy realities, it's a film about generational trailblazers who have surmounted prejudice and defied expectation to form communities of strength, renewal and camaraderie – whether these communities be affable senior living facilities, lively activist enclaves or wacky queer bars brimming with glittered trinkets and colorful drag queens.





Black Is Blue tells the story of Black, an African-American transman, quietly following him over the course of a day, and revealing a journey from his past life as Blue. My My is a futuristic epic set in a trailer park. It's a search for kinship and understanding with robots. In Wannabe, Sofia reluctantly returns to the family home she swore never to return to after her father announced his decision to live as a woman.

Jannik Splidsboel gently examines first love, longing, coming out, finding your place, and the hopes and dreams of the three young people.

In Tab Hunter Confidential we will meet the real Tab Hunter, as he shares for the first time the whole story of a happy, healthy survivor of the Hollywood rollercoaster.

From veteran LGBT filmmaker Jeffrey Schwarz, director of *I Am Divine* and *Vito*, comes another story of a gay icon, though this time one who kept his sexuality secret for most of his life.
