



25 years of GAZE through the pages of Gay Community News Light House Cinema Lower Ground Floor: 2nd - 6th August

Since its beginnings as a gay film club at the IFI, and its first bona fide festival in 1993, GAZE has enjoyed a close relationship with Ireland's LGBT+ publication, GCN. To coincide with GCN's momentous 30th birthday, we're hosting a very special exhibition of GAZE GCN covers throughout the years, celebrating a community collaboration that's always been at the heart of the festival.

The first GAZE festival (then called the Seventh Heaven) was featured in GCN July 1993, with the headline 'Heaven For Film Buffs', and films like Claire of the Moon, Thank God I'm a Lesbian and Dead Boys Club received great write-ups. From that point on, GCN was there every year, getting the word about the festival out to Ireland's queer community

"GCN has been integral to the grounding of GAZE as a community festival," says editor Brian Finnegan. "And in return, GAZE has been a great supporter of GCN. It's a real story of community working together, and I'm looking forward to the exhibition, which will be full of blasts from the past, commemorating the fact."



When GAZE Film Festival contacted me in early 2018 about their desire to do a focus on Australian LGBT cinema, I was 4 weeks from opening night of Queer Screen's 25th Mardi Gras Film Festival and it was also the anniversary of the 40th Sydney Gay & Lesbian Mardi Gras (learn all about it at the screening of Riot). To say I was busy is an understatement, but that didn't stop my immediate agreeance to assist in any way Queer Screen could. I can assure you none of this was due to lack of sleep, or the fact that both our President and Vice President are Irish. It was simply because the synergy between our two LGBT communities can not be ignored, most notably due to us being the only countries who have both fought and won marriage equality through public vote.

GAZE have programmed a fantastic array of Australian films for you, including a former winner of our Audience Award for Best Documentary, *Remembering The Man* and *Black Divaz*, which had its world premiere and two standing ovations at our recent festival, to name just a few. 


NICK MCCARTHY

Seán McGovern is a Film Programmer and Festival Producer, originally from Lanesboro, Co. Longford. Now based in the UK, he programmes Fringe! Queer Film and Arts Fest which takes place in East London every November. He's worked with BFI Flare, now helping select the shorts for the 2018 London Film Festival. Previously, Seán ran The VITO Project, a monthly queer-community film series in London's historic Cinema Museum. He also co-hosts Broad Appeal, an irreverent film podcast that takes an obsessive, queer perspective on female-centred films. The first film festival he ever attended was GAZE, back in 2007, and he's delighted to be on the jury in 2018.

An independent jury will adjudicate the Best International Short Film Award and Best Documentary Award. as well as the award we hold dearest to our heart, the GAZE Best Irish Short Film Award, which celebrates Irish LGBT film and filmmaking talent. Saturday 4th August 10:00am - 1:00pm Screen 3 As part of our ongoing commitment to promoting the creation of Irish LGBTQ film content, GAZE presents the MobDoc - Mobile Filmmaking Workshop, an initiative to encourage our festival audience to become active storytellers, embrace their creativity, and stimulate the propagation of Irish LGBTQ storytelling.

MobDoc involves practical exercises focused on learning how to tell LGBTQ stories utilising mobile filmmaking technologies. The aim is to teach people how to begin to challenge the narrative in LGBTQ films by developing skills to create a film during the workshop. Ultimately we hope to empower participants to tell their own stories using their smartphone.

The session will be facilitated by tutor Deirdre Mulcahy who has spent the last 11 years training BBC journalists, after a long successful career as a BBC camerawoman.

Riot shines a spotlight on Australia's gay and lesbian rights movement and the passionate individuals who, facing everpresent adversity, conceived a celebration of diversity, in what is now a key moment in LGBTQ history.

In the infancy of the Australian gay rights movement of the 1970's, LGBT people lived a life of mistreatment in their communities and faced police brutality and legislative persecution. Led by gallant everyman Lance Gowland, a devoted and seasoned activist community began to focus on the fight for civil rights. Securing a permit for a legal protest, a small but passionate group collected behind a truck driven by Lance, to stage a street party and joyfully declare their pride. Riot is not a sombre tale of torment and oppression, but rather an uplifting and inspirational tale of the roots of Sydney's Mardi Gras parade, and those who fought to bring equality to Australia's LGBTQ community.

When unambitious musician *Becks* is forced to move back to her childhood home in St. Louis after a crushing breakup with her longtime girlfriend, she must contend with issues from her past and her struggles to find a connection with her ultra-Catholic mother. Making ends meet by playing for tips in a local bar, she strikes up a magnetic friendship with the wife of her former high school nemesis. Though she begins to grow more confident as a musician, complications in her personal life jeopardize her chances of finding a new life in her old town.

Becks perfectly encapsulates that unwelcome feeling many of us can relate to; that of regression in life; and faltering behind the perceived notions of one's conventional life trajectory. A unique take on the American movie musical, it is a charming story of drifting, divergence and the redemptive power of finding your artistic voice.

An artfully crafted and auspicious feature debut, *They* offers a simple and realistic filmic depiction of a complex subject - a pre-teen's decision process on whether they want to change their gender.

Fourteen-year-old J goes by the pronoun "They" and lives with their parents in the suburbs of Chicago. J is exploring their gender identity while taking hormone blockers to postpone puberty. After two years of medication and therapy, J has to make the decision on whether or not to transition. Over a crucial weekend while their parents are away, J's sister Lauren and her partner Araz arrive to take care of "They". An intelligent study of modern-day identity issues, which premiered at Cannes and counts the legendary Jane Campion as executive producer, They shows great promise from it's Iranian writer/director Anahita Ghazvinizadeh and takes an interesting and introspective look at a complicated matter.

Outitude is a heartfelt documentary that attempts to get to the core of what it means to be lesbian - exploring what defines us, what connects us, and what our commonalities are. Conducting numerous interviews and group discussions with members of the Irish LGBTQI+ community of all ages and walks of life, the film delves into the lives of rural and urban lesbians, poets, writers, activists, self-professed bar dykes, and gueer and curious women.

The film gathers the personal stories of lesbians involved in many of the organisations past and present that have made the community what it is today. Telling tales of coming out, experiences of homophobia and the varied types of activism that offer a kaleidoscope of the richness of the Irish lesbian community, this film is an important document for posterity, and celebrates the diversity of voices of this community for both current and future generations.

Recalling the era when it was illegal for two men to hold hands in public, the pristine beachfront hamlet depicted in *Cherry Grove Stories* was a safe haven for gay men and women seeking refuge from the persecution of their everyday lives.

Within this oral and visual history, residents recount folklore from the community, starting in the 1940s when gay men first began congregating in a place that offered a rare retreat from the pervasive homophobia of the time. Their tales are poignant, funny and often outrageous; include tales of the first drag parties and escapades to the infamous Meat Rack.

Visually, this documentary comes to life on-screen through compelling and intimate original interviews intercut with emotionally-charged archival footage, uncovering long-hidden secrets and exposing little known stories of this oft mythologised gay paradise.

Wild Nights with Emily, starring queen Molly Shannon in the titular role, challenges the poet's popularized persona - that of a reclusive spinster and a delicate wallflower, too sensitive for this world. The film explores her vivacious side that was covered up for years - most notably in Emily's lifelong romantic relationship with another woman. Directed by Madeleine Olnek, whose previous titles include GAZE favourites The Foxy Merkins and Codependent Lesbian Space Alien Seeks Same, Wild Nights with Emily is an irreverent and surreal look at the (maybe) true life story of the legendary poetess.






