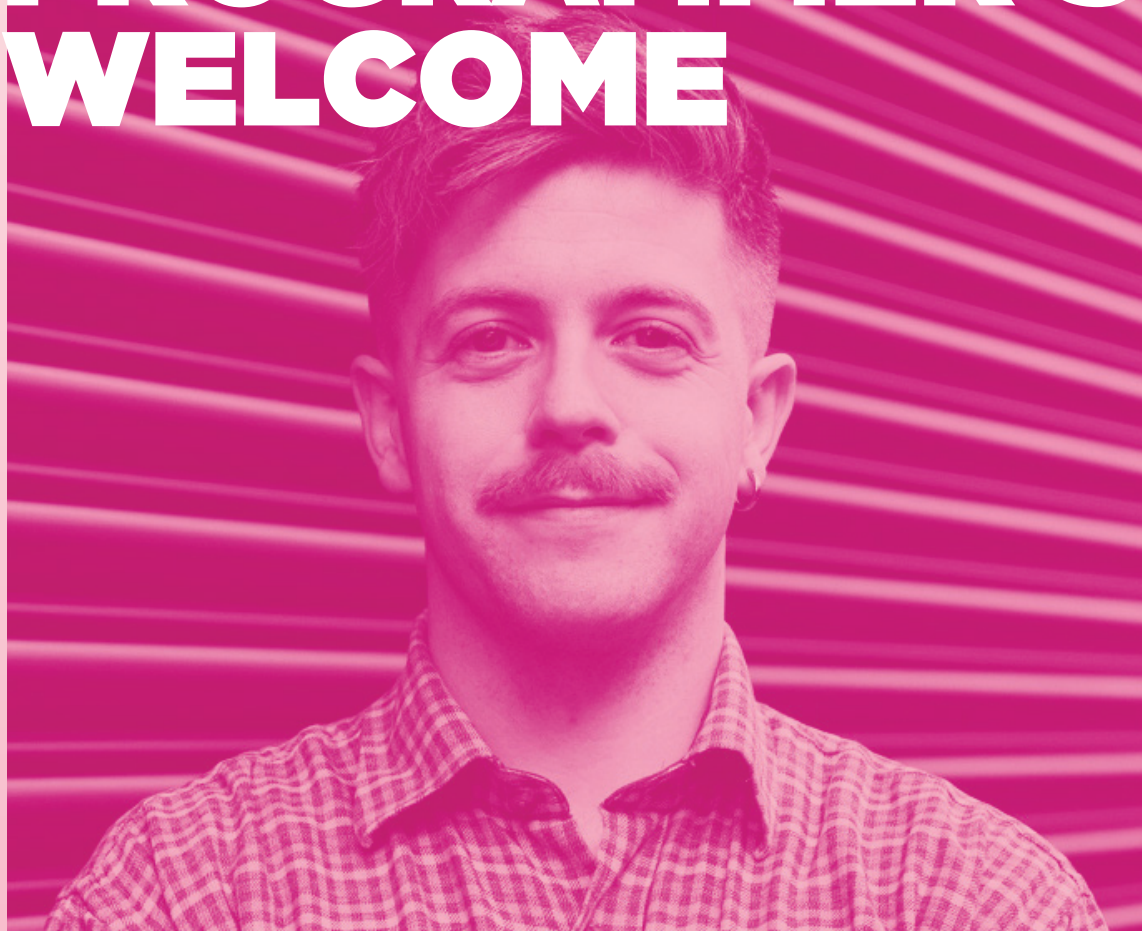
I hope you'll join us from your sofa, your pal's kitchen table, or (dare we hope) in person at the end of September.

# HOW TO WATCH ONLINE

## How to Guide

Films that are only available on IFI@Home can be viewed at any time from the day they become live, but to bring the “Film Festival Experience” to your sitting room, we’ve put in a Suggested Viewing Time for each of these films. Just like in every other year, we want you to have a packed schedule over the festival dates.

## Create an Account

To watch films, you need to first Create an Account at [www.ifihome.ie](http://www.ifihome.ie) and Sign In.

Browse or Search

## Buy your tickets early

Just like in the actual cinema, there are a limited number of tickets to view each film so book early to avoid disappointment.

## How to Watch Online

As with every edition of GAZE, you have to wait until the festival kicks off to watch your film. If you have pre-ordered films, check the GAZE schedule as they will be ready to view in your library on the day of the screening. Once live, you will have THREE days to watch the film from their premiere date, and TWO days to complete your viewing once you press play. Please note that rentals cannot be reactivated once they have expired. To watch the film straight away, click **Play Now**, and the film will start.

If you rent a film later in the festival after its initial premiere date, the film will become live in your library for a period of THREE days from the moment of purchase.

IFI@Home supports a wide-range of devices and platforms, converting your living room into your own personal cinema!

# HOW TO WATCH ONLINE

And while it won't exactly be the cinema, there's a few things you can do to create the perfect illusion.

- Turn down the lights. Use a big TV. Don't even think of watching these films on an Apple Watch.
- Get a projector and find a perfect wall at home. The desert island luxury item for our Programmer, even a good second hand one makes all the difference. Does your work have any? "Borrow" one.
- Sit real close to the TV screen (don't).
- Decide with your pals where you want to sit at home. One of you might want to be in the back, and another at the front, so find a solution by sitting somewhere neither of you is happy with.
- If you need to go to the bathroom, make sure you make everyone stand up regardless if they're in your way or not. Block the screen too.
- Make sure you're with someone who loves absolute silence during a film, and another who always likes to talk. This will make it super authentic.
- And make sure to check out the bonus content with your purchase at IFI @ HOME, because many of the films will have **introductions, Q+As and post-show discussions.**

# FOCUS ON GERMAN CINEMA



**Rainer Werner Fassbinder. Ulrike Ottinger. Monika Treut. Douglas Sirk.** You know what I mean.

Germany has made a huge impact on LGBTQ+ cinema, and today it represents a nation of liberal values and personal freedoms - of course anyone who takes the odd weekend trip to Berlin knows that!

German filmmakers have long contributed to queer visibility, whether LGBTQ+ people themselves, or allies with a firm sense of human dignity. In Leontine Sagan's *Mädchen in Uniform* (1931), it is not the young student with same-sex desires who is punished, but the villainous headmistress who wants to shame her. Those who joined us for GAZE 2019 may have seen *Different from the Others* (1919), a landmark film, now over a century old, that treated its homosexual characters with sympathy. From the horrors of the Second World War, emerged a nation determined to right its wrongs.

At GAZE 2020 we want to honour Germany's contribution to queer cinema, but without turning to obvious names and films, as much as we love them! Instead we present three very different feature films as well as two short films.

# FOCUS ON GERMAN CINEMA

The features each represent an aspect of German LGBTQ+ life and experience. *Cocoon* is a beautiful and life-affirming coming of age story about one girl's transformative summer, *Taxi Zum Klo* is a raucous and hilarious snapshot of West Berlin gay life in 1980 that feels shockingly current, and Closing Film *No Hard Feelings* explores life as a second generation German-Iranian and speaks very much to our time.

We want to thank the Goethe-Institut Irland for their continued support in presenting German cinema in Ireland, and their willingness to support a motley crew of films, which is exactly what we stand for!

# GAZE 2020 JURY



## **STEPHEN QUINN**

Stephen Quinn is a theatre and performance maker based in Dublin. He has been mentored by iconic queer artists including Lois Weaver (Split Britches) and Scottee at Beyond Queer (Metal, Peterborough), and Peaches as part of MAKE 2018. Recent performance credits include Anu Productions' *Faultline* at the Dublin Theatre Festival in 2019, *Overfired*, winner of the Outburst Queer Fringe Award at Dublin Fringe Festival 2018, and Taylor Mac's *A 24 Decade History of Popular Music: The First Act* at the Barbican in London. Stephen is also co-creative director and co-host of the popular queer performance event *SPICEBAG*, where he performs as his alter ego Stefan Fae.

## **KATIE MCNEICE**

Katie is a writer and director from Co. Kerry, whose debut short *In Orbit* won Best Irish Short at GAZE 2019. Up next is *Lambing*, which looks at themes of intersex identity and masculinity in rural Ireland and won the 2020 IMDb Script to Screen Award. Her poetic Irish language short *Focail Baile Croí* won the 2020 Comórtas Fisín pitching competition and will also film next year. Katie's debut feature script *Lily*, co-written with Graham Cantwell, is a coming-of-age LGBT drama which is now in post-production. She is also a full-time producer of inclusive educational content for global learning company HMH.

# GAZE FILM AWARDS 2020



Each year, the GAZE Film Awards celebrate the best and brightest of Irish and international LGBTQ+ stories, as chosen by a panel of distinguished jury members, our esteemed festival board of directors, and our wonderful festival audience.

The *Spirit of GAZE Award* will be decided upon by the festival board and presented to the film that best embodies the spirit of this year's festival. An independent jury will adjudicate the *Best International Short Film Award* and *Best Documentary Award*, as well as the *GAZE Best Irish Short Film Award*, which celebrates the work of Irish LGBTQ+ film. The hotly contested *Audience Award for Best Film* will be chosen by YOU, via an online poll that can be completed after viewing.

**The GAZE Film Awards 2020 will be announced online on Closing Night.**

# VANGUARD 2020 DAVID NORRIS

*Three years ago we set up the GAZE Vanguard Award to honour an individual or organisation who has made a significant contribution to the LGBTQ+ community in Ireland. The inaugural recipient in 2018 was former President Mary McAleese, and last year we were delighted to honour Ailbhe Smyth, academic, activist and one of Time magazine's most influential people of the year for 2019.*

This year we are delighted to announce Senator David Norris as the 2020 recipient of the GAZE Vanguard Award, in honour of his contribution to LGBTQ+ rights and Ireland's cultural and political life for more than 50 years.

Throughout his life, he has played a leading role in Irish LGBTQ+ activism, and was instrumental in setting up key organisations including the National LGBT Federation, the Hirschfeld Centre and the Campaign for Homosexual Law Reform.

He took his decade-long legal battle with the Irish government all the way to the European Court of Human Rights, where his ultimate vindication led to decriminalisation of homosexuality in 1993.

# VANGUARD 2020 DAVID NORRIS

He was first elected to Seanad Éireann as a Trinity College Senator in 1987, becoming the first openly gay person elected to public office in Ireland, and has been re-elected at every election since, making him Father of the House and one of the longest-serving Senators.

Renowned as one of Ireland's leading scholars of the work of James Joyce, he was founding Chairman of the James Joyce Centre and has written and lectured extensively about Joyce and his work. He is also known for his work on national and international human and civil rights and equality issues as well as the conservation of Dublin's architectural heritage, and he was founding Chairman of the North Great Georges Street Preservation Society

He is a true national gay treasure and we are honoured to present him with the 2020 GAZE Vanguard Award.

We open GAZE 2020 with a film that speaks to the urgency of life, and our need to fulsomely embrace all the love that comes our way. Nina (Barbara Sukowa) and Madeleine (Martine Chevallier) are neighbours, pensioners living across the hall from each other. Nina is a passionate free spirit, and Madeline is a widow with grown children, who too often treat her like she didn't raise them from infancy. But how would her children react when she tells them that she and Nina have been together for the last ten years? When illness strikes Madeline, the need for the two to live truthfully becomes more necessary and more complex.

Skillfully avoiding the conventional structure of a love story, Meneghetti's tender film is laced with the pain of life lived under the eye of expectation. Nina and Madeline remind us that love can happen at any age, and we begin this year's festival with that important message.

Olivia, a Filipina trans woman in New York (played by director Isabel Sandoval), struggles to make ends meet. She works as a carer to Olga, an elderly Russian woman, while brokering a deal with her sketchy boyfriend to get a Green Card. When Olga's grandson, the handsome but boozy Alex, shows up, things get more complicated and attractions begin to stir. The situation is hard as it is: will Alex's macho attitude make things worse?

Beautifully atmospheric and commandingly shot, Sandoval broke new ground by becoming the first trans woman to present a film at the Venice Film Festival. *Lingua Franca* brings a distinct authenticity to this narrative tale, and introduces extraordinary everyday characters on the fringes of society, navigating contemporary America in whatever ways they can.

Winner of the TEDDY Award for Best Documentary at the 2020 Berlin Film Festival, *If It Were Love* straddles our perceptions of what is real and fiction, staged and spontaneous, and crucially, the truth in those euphoric moments when the BPM matches your heart rate.

Centred around the professional and personal lives of the dancers in *Crowd*, a performance by choreographer Gisèle Vienne inspired by 90s rave culture, we follow this multi-gendered troupe as their bodies become vessels of movement and emotion.

In a time when we are still denied the thrill of the sweat-soaked dance floor, this film takes on a poignant sense of loss and wanting. A delirious high. Catch this one in the cinema if you can.

Ben has done a good job keeping his guard up. Through casual encounters with men and women, the most they get from him is the remnants of pillow talk as he puts on his socks. But after meeting the handsome Sam while browsing some books, the two form a bond far beyond what Ben is used to giving another person. His airhead psychotherapist won't listen to him, but Sam encourages Ben to share things about his past, slowly chipping away at the walls he has built. Will Sam's honesty give Ben courage to find his own?

Like our central hero, *Cicada* is disarmingly sexy, but as it uncoils we explore the all-too-universal question of just what do we reveal to our partners in a relationship, and more importantly, what are we forced to reveal to ourselves?

Max and Victoria are boyfriend and girlfriend. They met in the Gaeltacht, and have been seeing each other for a few years. Victoria studies film and Max studies biotechnology. They also happen to both be trans.

*Tras* is a radical little documentary for a few reasons, not least that it's in the Irish language. But its power is in the quiet strength of the protagonists. As Max and Victoria grow up as their true selves, we watch the people around them adapt. Their parents are open about the fact that they have struggled with their children's transition. Neither sensationalist, nor ordinary, *Tras* is an honest work that focuses on one of the smallest and most marginalized minorities in Irish society and allows them to flourish and be themselves.

Washington, D.C., the heart of American politics, and a city of massive racial and income inequality. *Check It*, a hit on the festival circuit from 2016, follows a unique set of teens with diverse sexual and gender identities who form their own “gay gang,” to stand up for themselves. Mess with these queers, they fight back.

We follow Duke, Skittles and Tray. Tray’s real love is fashion, and we follow them and others as they attend a fashion summer camp, a softer side to the hard-edged members of the Check-It gang. Beyond the initial novelty of “gay gangs” is a story of young people who are ready to challenge any obstacles they face, be it antagonism on the street or the limitations of what they’ve been told to expect in life. Though at times shocking, *Check It* is a documentary with a whole lot of heart.

When Karen is left jilted by her older lover, D, she gets a set of keys and heads to D's beautiful second home in the woods of Oregon. Karen heads out of LA to get some perspective, and more importantly, get their dog. But her solitude is quickly upended by the arrival of Lana, a girl-woman who seems young but is most certainly wily. Like all great narratives about disruptors, she is unexpected and curious, tantalizing but unwelcome. Karen doesn't know what to do with her, and that's only the start of things to come.

Beautifully shot, making the wilderness at times feel claustrophobic, Lara-Jean Gallagher deftly crafts a Hitchcockian indie, with the ominous string score jangling our nerves as things get progressively, and mysteriously, out of hand.

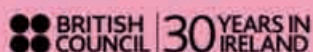

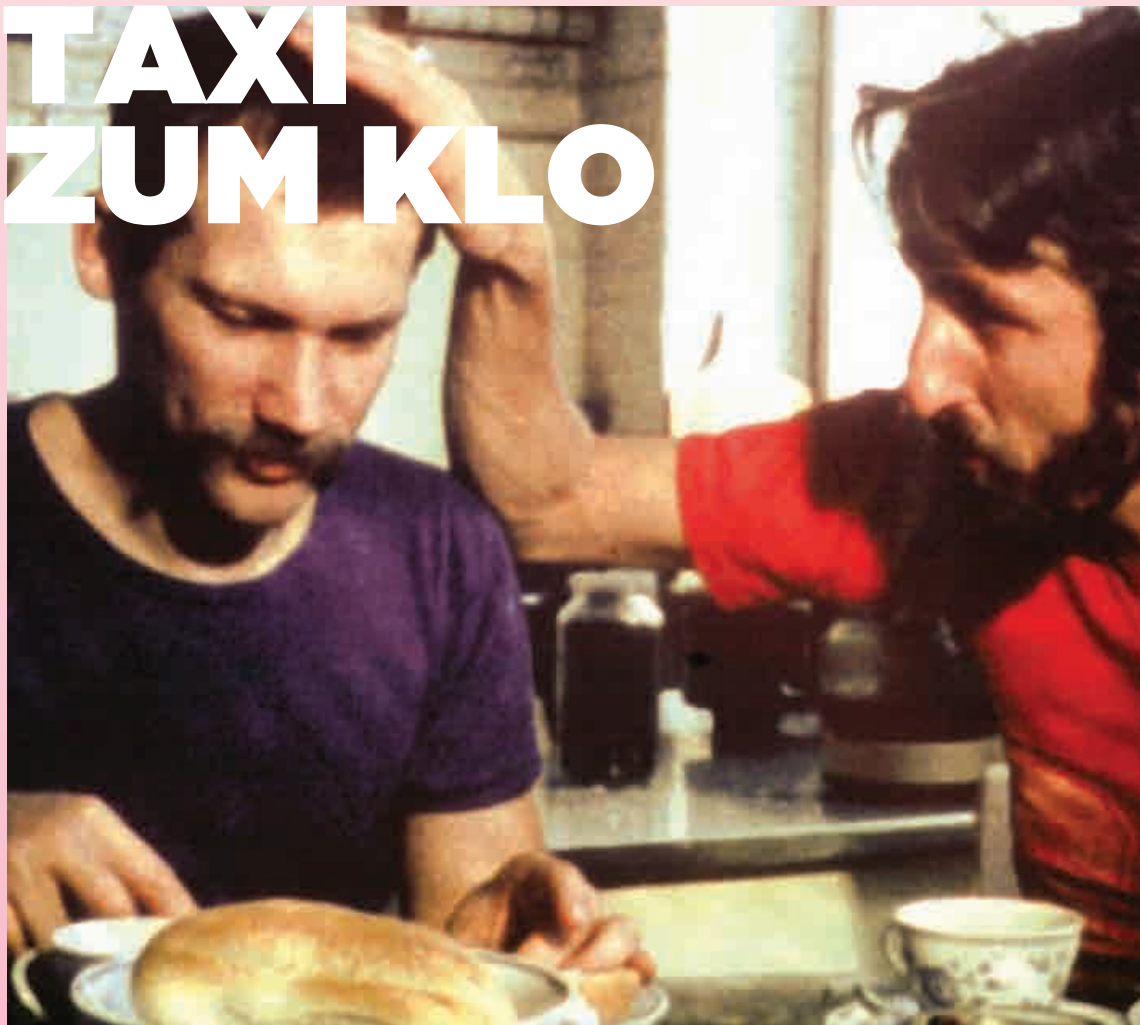

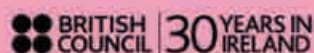

In 2017, Russian opposition newspaper Novaya Gazeta reported on cases of gay men being rounded up and tortured in Chechnya. The reports went so far as to call them concentration camps. What emerged caused shock and disgust on an international level. Moscow denied the claims. Ramzan Kadyrov, Chechnya's strongman leader said that there were no LGBT people in the region, because even if there were, their families would have already killed them. *Welcome to Chechnya* is an astonishing documentary, featuring guerilla filmmaking of the highest order. Following escapees from Chechnya, and the tireless and life-threatening work of LGBT activists in Moscow and St Petersburg, the film gives a human face to the invisible people risking their lives to fight for their very right to exist. It demonstrates that, although we have achieved hard-won rights in many countries, to simply be an LGBT person in many parts of the world remains a death-defying act. *Welcome to Chechnya* is urgent and necessary viewing, and a masterpiece of documentary cinema.

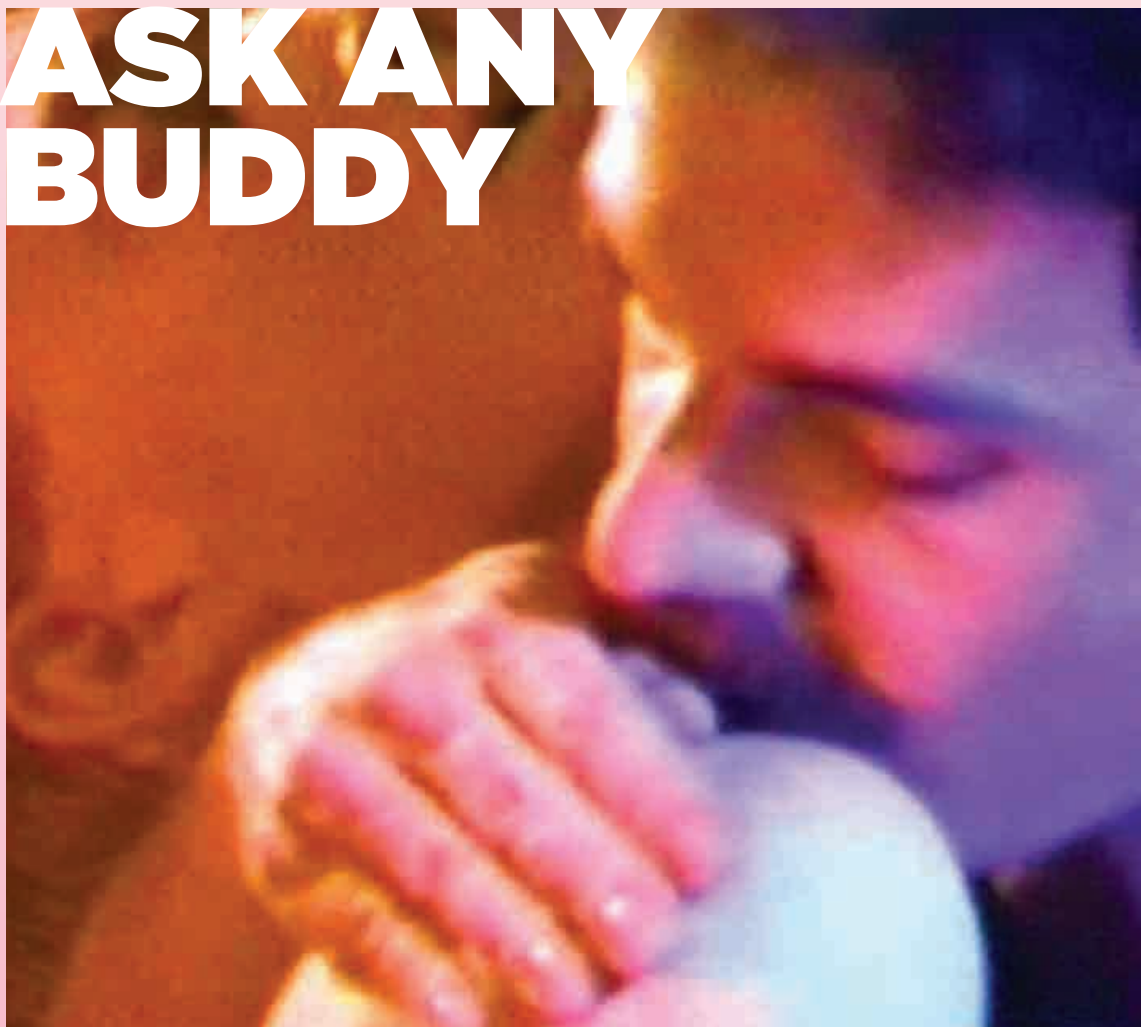

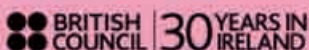
